June 11 Election Information

Sanford voters will head to the polls on Tuesday, June 11 for the School Budget Validation referendum (see that story for more info), as well as for primary elections. This is the election to vote for the state, county and federal candidates from the Democratic, Republican and Green Independent parties to appear on the November 5 general election ballot.

General Election Information

Maine now has 'semi-open' primaries, which means unenrolled voters (those who are not enrolled in any party, commonly referred to as independent) can now participate in primaries and are not required to enroll in the party they choose to vote for. They simply will indicate their choice for

the party ballot they want to vote for and remain unenrolled. This can also be done for voters requesting an absentee ballot by checking the box for the party you want to receive a ballot for. Here's what you should know before casting your ballot:

- · 17-year-olds are permitted to vote in the June 11 election if they will be 18 years old by November 5.
- · Voters 65 and older or with disabilities may request to receive absentee ballots on an ongoing basis.
- · Voting hours are between 7 am-8 pm June 11, with 8 pm also being the cutoff for absentee ballot acceptance.
- · The City of Sanford/Springvale is divided into three electoral districts or "wards." Your address determines which ward you

Primary Election Features School Budget Referendum

Voters who go to the polls on June 11 to decide on parties' candidates for next November's election will also see a referendum on the school budget for 2024-25.

The City Council recently approved a combined city and school budget that represents a 6.8% increase over the current budget, raising the mill rate – what property owners pay for each \$1,000 of assessed value – from \$15.14 to \$16.17. It is possible that the rate could decrease with increased valuation. The school budget is approximately 43% of the mill rate. Maine law

requires districts to put the school portion of their budgets to a public vote each year.

Superintendent Matt Nelson said the School Department's expenses have increased, mainly because of contracts, health insurance and transportation. At the same time, the city's property valuation has increased, which means the state has reduced its subsidy. This has led to some cuts to programs and staffing.

"Under the circumstances, I am proud of this school budget, especially during these inflationary times when many expenses are beyond our control," Nelson wrote in a

Large Committee Starts Work on City Guidance Document

The Sanford City Council recently named 31 people to a Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee to update the city's long-range planning document, last updated in 2005. The group includes city councilors, city staff, business owners and citizens. They met for the first time on May 22 to get acquainted and orient themselves to the task ahead.

The process will be led by City Planner Erin Moriarty, a veteran of community-wide engagement efforts. Moriarty has guided the development of 10 comprehensive plans, four downtown plans and one regional transportation plan in earlier work as a private consultant.

At the kickoff meeting, Moriarty provided an overview of the process, which is aimed at reviewing existing data and trends and charting a path forward while remaining responsive to residents.

Moriarty identified seven trends current in comp planning: aging in place; urban

livability and walkability; flex work and co-working; buy local and farm to table; transit-oriented development; historic preservation and adaptive reuse; and tourism, marketing and brand.

The process will take a year or more and will include multiple opportunities for participation from the wider community, including periodic community workshops, planning pop-ups and community surveys, Moriarty said. "It's important that (the comp plan) is unique to Sanford," she said.

The group spent most of the first meeting cataloging Sanford's strengths, weaknesses, and opportunities. Its next meeting, featuring a market analysis overview, is scheduled for June 26.

This online service is not available for the school budget validation referendum, only for the primary election. You may also request an absentee ballot for both elections by calling the City Clerk's office at 207-324-9125.

Absentee voting in person is available now through June 6. Stop by the City Clerk's office Monday through Thursday from 7:30 am to 5:30 pm. June 6 is also the last day to request an absentee ballot online or by mail.

- YORK COUNTY CANDIDATES -

There are three candidates for county-wide seats this year. All are incumbents and all are running unopposed. Democrat Scott Houde is seeking reelection as Judge of Probate for York County, Republican Carol Lovejoy is running for another term as York County Register of Probate, and Republican Donna Ring is seeking reelection as York County Commissioner.

- CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATES -

Democrat Chellie Pingree is seeking election to a ninth term representing Maine's 1st District in the U.S. House of Representatives. She is unopposed in the primary.

The only contested race in the entire election is on the Republican primary ballot to choose a candidate to challenge Pingree in November. Andrew Piantidosi of Cape Elizabeth works as a substitute teacher following a career in sales and business; Ronald Russell of Kennebunkport is a retired military veteran and defense industry consultant. There is also a declared write-in candidate on the Green Independent Party's ballot, Nicholas Vigue of Clinton.

County Commissioners OK Homeless Assistance Plan

Agencies that aid homeless people in York County now have a new source of funds to help people get into housing and stay there.

About a year ago, the York County Budget Committee added \$125,000 to the 2024 York County operational budget to help combat homelessness. County Manager Greg Zinser met with municipal managers, but there was little consensus on how best to help. That led to discussions with the York County Homeless Response Hub – a group of social service agencies from throughout the county – and a proposal that county commissioners approved unanimously on May 15.

The \$125,000 will go toward helping with housing placement and diversion funding, which helps keep people in their homes. According to Abigail Smallwood, the Homeless Response Hub coordinator, funding would initially be split between placement and diversion, tracked and assessed, and then adjusted based on feedback and experience. The cap per household would be \$2,000. In the proposal, Smallwood estimated at least 50 households could be served.

"Support would consist of a one-time payment that addresses the main issue preventing someone from being placed in housing or remaining in housing," Smallwood wrote.

The initial split offers \$54,625 each for placement and diversion, with \$15,750 set aside for administrative costs.

When possible, York County funds would be used to supplement other, existing funding sources. Smallwood wrote that while there are several resources available, they often do not go far enough to cover the need; the county funding would cover the gap. The funds would be administered by York County Community Action Corp. Financial awards for placement and diversion would be tracked on the Homeless Management Information System.

Commissioner Justin Chenette wondered

if more people could be helped if all of the funds were to go to placement, rather than a combination of placement and diversion. "I have no doubt the recommendation (from the Hub) is solid ... but that would maximize reach," he said.

Zinser said a car repair that allows someone to go to work – and therefore keeps the roof over their head – is as critical as placement.

"If people lose their house they lose a lot. It's more than one thing," said Commissioner Richard Clark, adding he believed keeping the diversion piece is important.

Zinser suggested letting the York County Homeless Response Hub know that commissioners would be amenable if some funding needs to be transferred between the two portions of the program.

"It gives them flexibility and assures us we're helping as many people as possible," Chenette said of that option. "I'm fine with that."

- STATE SENATE DISTRICT 33 -

Matthew "Matt" Harrington was born and raised in Maine. He is currently serving his first term in the Maine State Senate representing the people of Alfred, Lebanon, Sanford and Waterboro. He sits on the Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety and the Committee on Energy, Utilities, and Technology. Prior to his service in the Senate, Harrington represented the people of District 19 for four terms in the Maine House of Representatives, where he served on several committees, including the Committee on Veterans and Legal Affairs. A longtime public safety professional, Harrington is currently a patrol officer for the Kennebunk Police Department. He is a graduate of Southern Maine Community College and earned his bachelor's degree in criminology from the University of Southern Maine. He and his family live in Sanford. Harrington is a member of the Sanford Elks Lodge, local Freemasons and Kora Temple Shriners, and is Chairman of his church's board of trustees.

- STATE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES -

DISTRICT 141: Lucas Lanigan is currently serving his first term in the State Legislature, where he represents Newfield and Shapleigh as well as parts of Sanford and Springvale. He sits on the Committee on Innovation, Development, Economic Advancement and Business and has worked to reduce taxes, advocate for small businesses, and increase support for those affected by substance use disorder. Lanigan has spent his career designing and installing lighting for weddings and other events and is currently Vice President of Lighting Operations for SHE/Luxe. He and his wife Catalina have four sons. Lanigan has served the City of Sanford as a City Councilor, Deputy Mayor, Planning Board member and member of the Marijuana Task Force. He has served as a board member for the Chamber of Commerce and has been a volunteer and coach with several youth sports organizations.

DISTRICT 142: Amy Bell has lived in Sanford for 20 years. She has an associate's degree in secretarial science. She previously homeschooled her children until she helped her husband, Pastor Todd Bell, start and operate the Sanford Christian Academy in 2010. She currently serves as the school's Administrator and as the Calvary Baptist Church Secretary. They have four children and three grandchildren. If elected, she hopes to focus on legislation that will lower inflation and living costs for families and seniors.

DISTRICT 143: Ann Fredericks is serving her first term in the State Legislature, during which she introduced two bills aimed at reducing taxation. She serves on the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services. As a nurse practitioner, she also takes an active role cosponsoring and advocating on health care issues. Fredericks has master's degrees in nursing and public administration and has also worked in the public sector for the Veterans Administration. She is a member of the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners and the Association of Cannabinoid Specialists. In 2016, she and her daughter opened Vetted Cannabis, a medical dispensary, in South Sanford, Fredericks' community involvement includes the Sanford Chamber of Commerce and the Sanford-Springvale YMCA. ■

- STATE SENATE DISTRICT 33 -

Daniel Lauzon is a retired locomotive engineer who ran freight and passenger trains for 42 years. During that time, he was elected to serve as the legislative representative for engineers in New England, advocating for rail safety and funding while prioritizing working families. Through this work, he was instrumental in creating over 500 permanent, good-paying jobs on the railway. Sanford awarded EPA grants for assessment and cleanup of mill properties: On May 20, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) awarded the City of Sanford substantial funding under the EPA Brownfields Program in two categories. The first is an Assessment Grant for \$500.000. which will be used to conduct ten Phase I and seven Phase II environmental site assessments. The focus area is the Historic Mill Yard, including priority sites such as the 7.2-acre International Woolen Mill site, the 9.5-acre Emery Mill site and the 3.53-acre Wasco Mill site. The second award, which is from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, is a Cleanup Grant for \$5 million. This grant will fund the cleanup of the International Woolen Mill Boiler House on Pioneer Avenue. The site. contaminated with various hazardous substances, will be remediated.

Library book sale raises additional funds: The donation-based book sale held at Goodall Library on May 17 and 18 raised \$555 for the library. The money will help with operating expenses at the library's temporary location. Director Ann Thomas and the library staff thank all those who supported the fundraising event.

Sanford native named DHHS acting commissioner: Gov. Janet Mills appointed Sanford native Sara Gagne-Holmes, deputy commissioner of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), as acting commissioner beginning June 1, temporarily replacing outgoing DHHS Commissioner Jeanne Lambrew. Gagne-Holmes served as deputy commissioner for the past five years, and practiced law with a focus on health care at a Maine firm before serving as a health policy and legal adviser to former Gov. John Baldacci. Lambrew is leaving the department to take a teaching position at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health and to serve as director of health care reform for The Century Foundation in Washington, D.C. According to a news release, Gov. Mills is still considering permanent candidates for DHHS commissioner and is expected to name a nominee in the coming weeks. Once a nominee is named, that person will be subject to a hearing before the Legislature's Health and Human Services Committee and confirmation by the state Senate.

The first distribution of the summer begins at Willard School and Sanford High School on June 13 from 3 pm to 5:30 pm. Distribution continues every Thursday through Aug. 22.

budget message to the community. "It is in line with other surrounding school districts in Southern Maine and York County." He said Sanford spends less per pupil, excluding costs like debt service and vocational program costs that most districts don't offer, than other area districts.

"Our main goal is to produce a budget that best meets the needs of our students, while doing our best to balance the ability of our community to support these needs. We continue to appreciate that the debt service for our new and upgraded school facilities is fully reimbursed by the State of Maine's Department of Education each year," Nelson wrote.

Nelson said the School Committee's proposed budget "provides the funding necessary to support the changing needs of our students and offer quality educational experiences for our community's most valuable resource – its children – in light of the ongoing dramatically shifting educational landscape."

Polls will be open from 7 am to 8 pm on June 11. Besides the school referendum, voters will have a chance to nominate party candidates for president, U.S. House, State Senate and State House.

The deadline to request an absentee ballot for the state elections – not the school vote – is Thursday, June 6. ■

Longtime Sanford Stylist Hangs Up His Scissors

After 49 years in the hairstyling business, Rodney LaPierre is looking forward to retirement. The 75-year-old proprietor of The Best Little Hair House in Town on Main Street in Sanford will hang up his scissors at the end of this week.

As a young man, LaPierre had originally planned to go into the medical field. After serving as a medic in the U.S. Air Force during the Vietnam War, he got a job at Goodall Hospital and was accepted to the physician's assistant program at Dartmouth College. But due to high demand for the program, he was told he would have to wait a year before he could begin taking classes. Since he had previously enjoyed cutting and styling hair for friends and family, he decided to enroll in a ninemonth beauty school course and work for three months until a spot opened up at Dartmouth. But those three months proved he could earn a living as a stylist and changed his future plans.

Initially, he worked for Theodore, who had a three-chair salon upstairs from Shaw's Hardware. In May of 1977, LaPierre decided to strike out on his own and

opened The Curling Room Etc. in the old Grant's building (now home to Republi-Cash). He stayed there for 11 years before moving to an even larger location at the corner of Washington and School Streets, and ran that for 12 years under the name Hair Etc.

After 23 years of being a boss, LaPierre decided it was time to scale back and sold his business. He and his then-wife purchased a house on Main Street and he opened The Best Little Hair House, which enabled him to work right from home. He was apprehensive at first about whether a home-based salon could draw enough cli-

ents, but the cheeky name caught people's attention and it was a success.

After LaPierre had rotator cuff surgery about ten years ago, he cut back from working five days a week to a three-and-ahalf day a week schedule. He was envious of friends who were able to retire, but fully expected he would never be able to afford to do so himself due to the expense involved in maintaining the house. "I used to tell my clients I would be doing their hair and they would hear a thud on the floor, and I would be dead and retired all at the same time," he says. Then, a few years ago he sold the house to his older son Jason, making retirement a possibility. Now, his son's family has the main part of the house while Rodney has a small apartment on the second floor – and the financial freedom to enjoy the next phase of his life.

LaPierre jokes that he will spend the first month of retirement in his bathrobe. "If you see me in my robe at Hannaford's, just tighten my belt and wish me well and leave me alone," he quips. He hopes to have ten years of continued good health to do some traveling and spend time with friends and family, including his younger son, Scotty.

School Committee Meeting Highlights: May 20, 2024

School Committee members on May 20 learned more about a new program that will expand access to high-quality pre-kindergarten education for 4-year-olds in town. Assistant Superintendent Steve Bussiere explained that the P-K Partnership grant from the Maine Department of Education will fund programming for 16 students at the YMCA, where many youngsters already go for daycare.

The pre-K component will be offered at no cost to parents or the School Department, Bussiere said. The YMCA will oversee the program and provide staffing, while the School Department will provide transportation and meals. The grant is for one year, but students served will be included in the future state subsidy funding formula, making this a program that will be sustainable over time.

Also at last week's meeting:

- · The committee unanimously approved contracts with teachers and ed techs, pending approval by the respective unions. Administrator continuing contracts were also announced.
- · Sanford Regional Technical Center Director Matthew Petermann provided information about updates to programs that have declined in their relevance for today's world. The committee unanimously approved his recommendations to update Digital Design to a Commercial Art Program and Robotics to Engineering Technologies.

- · Based on surveys to students in partner schools as well as available space, Petermann recommended adding two new SRTC programs in the 2025/26 school year. The addition of a Baking and Pastry Program and an Athletic Training Program was unanimously approved. A formal application to Maine's Department of Education will now follow.
- · Petermann was recognized as recipient of the annual Backpack Benefit with the "Friend of Backpack" Award. He has supported the program in many ways, including providing space for food distribution and support for the development of the Spart Mart.
- · Curriculum Director Beth Lambert and Bussiere provided a follow-up to the previous presentation of changes to the federal title programs, with more information on how the funds will be allocated. An opportunity for public comment about the changes will take place in the near future.
- · A PSA video created by students from the Sanford High Theater Club, about the harm caused by vaping, was shown. It encourages students to make good choices for their future health.
- · A brochure of available summer activities developed by Lambert and Communications Coordinator Sam Bonsey was presented with the plan for distribution. Also, the latest Sanford Spotlight Newsletter highlighting happenings in

the schools throughout the district was presented. It can be read here.


- · Student Representatives Aiden Gendron and Emma Adawadkar were honored for their commitment to the School Committee for the past two years. Both are graduating in the top ten of their class and shared their college and other plans.
- · A donation from the Sanford Schools Legacy Foundation for the naming of the Margaret Chase Smith School Library in honor of Sharon Remick was unanimously approved. The naming celebration, open to the public, was to be held on Thursday, May 30.
- · Superintendent Nelson presented staff resignations retirements, appointments and transfers.
- · Several year-end school events were announced, including the SHS graduation on June 5 and Adult Education graduation on June 12. The School Budget Referendum is on June 11.



High School Students Preparing for Solar Job Opportunities

Students in the Electrical Wiring Program at Sanford Regional Technical Center are gaining real-life experience at its Clean Energy Learning Lab. Through a collaboration with Northeast Electric and Gowen Power Systems, students have installed solar panels on the field house building at Alumni Stadium.

This learning opportunity – described to School Committee members at the May 20 meeting – was developed by Jay Desmond from Northeast Electric, a board member of Skills USA, with Electrical Wiring instructor Tim Fecteau, also a board member. Their goal was to develop a "microgrid" that would provide some power benefit to the school as well as learning opportunities to current and future students.

Employers are interested in skilled employees with strong social skills and work ethic to meet the demand. This project provides students with the real feel and understanding of what's important. It's a small project that simulates a grid for a home. The solar panels already installed will not be removed. However, a final piece with solar panels is being put on the ground so it can be turned off each year, allowing new students to take the panels off and see what it's like to install and test them.

President John Weyrens of Gowen Power Systems spoke about the importance of electricity in the future and of having passionate, skilled electricians. Currently, most people working on green energy are coming from out of state, making this a career with exciting opportunities here in Maine, he said.

The \$30,000 project has been done at no cost to taxpayers due to collaboration and contributions from the companies involved. Jason Rowe, a current senior in the Electrical Wiring Program, expressed appreciation to all involved for giving him the opportunity to work on "what is basically the future."
