

## **Candidates for STATE OFFICE Address Voters**

Candidates for State Senate and Sanford/Springvale's three State House seats gathered at City Hall on Oct. 9 to answer questions posed by moderators Shawn Sullivan and Tammy Wells.

### Senate District 33

Republican Matt Harrington is completing his first term representing District 33. He previously served four terms as state representative. He is employed as a police officer and realtor. His Democratic opponent, Dan Lauzon, is a retired locomotive engineer and served as the legislative representative for New England's engineers and trainmen for decades.

Both said the state needs to do more to address problems that lead to homelessness. Lauzon emphasized his experience working with rail workers with PTSD, and Harrington said the state's needle exchange program is not working. On the subject of guns, both said the public and police officers need to understand how the state's yellow flag law works and should be implemented. Harrington said he believes the state's 72-hour waiting period for gun purchases is unconstitutional.

### **House District 141**

Democrat Patricia Kidder, a retired tax preparer, grew up in Shapleigh and raised her family in Springvale. Incumbent Lucas Lanigan, a Republican, is completing his first term in the House. He described himself as an independent voice, and said his absences this session were due to a health problem.

The two differed on the issue of alternative energy. Lanigan said the Legislature needs to stop making ratepayers and taxpayers subsidize solar and wind farms,

which he said contributes to higher bills. Kidder agreed the costs are not acceptable but said that solar farms are helping to reduce the impacts of climate change. She recommended homeowners join a community solar program to save money. On the issue of abortion rights, Kidder said government has no place in reproductive decisions, and Lanigan said he supported the state's previous law but that now Maine has "the most radical abortion bill in the U.S."

### **House District 142**

Republican challenger Amy Bell is the administrator of the Sanford Christian Academy who moved to Sanford in 2003. She describes herself as a wife, mother and grandmother rather than a politician. The incumbent, Democrat Anne-Marie Mastraccio, has represented parts of Sanford and Springvale in the Legislature for 10 years. She was previously a School Committee member, town councilor and mayor.


Both said they hope to address the shortage of medical workers in Maine. On the issue of guns, Bell advocated more education and mental health treatment rather than restrictions. "It wasn't the gun that killed people" in the Lewiston mass shooting last year, she said, "it was the shooter." Mastraccio pointed to the suicide rate and the fact that guns are now the leading cause of death for children in the U.S. and said responsible gun owners are happy to wait 72 hours to buy a weapon.

### **House District 143**

Democratic challenger Katie Manende Hall is a wildlife biologist in charge of vegetation management programs for Central Maine Power. She has been involved in numerous boards and committees since moving to Sanford seven years ago. Incumbent Ann Fredericks, a Republican, is a nurse practitioner with 35 years of experience working with the Veterans Administration. She is a small business owner with a medical cannabis office in South Sanford.

Both candidates support the state's yellow flag law, which Fredericks said has been used more since the Lewiston shooting. Manende Hall said she doubts the 72-hour waiting period is really effective since people seem to find ways to buy guns if they really want them. The candidates disagreed on one of the least controversial issues of the night – the question of whether the state should adopt the pine tree flag that is based on the original banner. Fredericks opposes the change; Manende Hall joked that as a forester, she naturally favors the pine tree flag.

## **Voices of LOCAL Candidates Heard**

Candidates for Sanford mayor, City Council and School Committee – all nonpartisan positions – answered questions posed by moderators Shawn Sullivan and Tammy Wells at City Hall on Oct. 8.

### MAYOR

Incumbent Mayor Becky Brink, a former school principal who manages her family's chiropractic practice, is challenged by Mathew Alan Dupuis, a master plumber who is active in local committees and youth sports. Brink said the city has recently made progress on housing, public safety and attracting new industries and businesses. Dupuis talked about the need for change and said it's important for residents to work together "or we'll keep going downhill."

Dupuis described himself as a non-politician who hears the concerns of many residents through his membership in local social clubs. He said he hopes to see more young people return to Sanford to live and work and more downtown development. Brink said the city has made progress in several areas, including building permits for many home upgrades and new homes. She identified several new businesses that have opened recently or are on the horizon. In addition, she noted that York County Community College has opened a new program in South Sanford to educate workers for Pratt & Whitney and the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

Both candidates support the proposal to replace the city's two fire stations. Brink said she's proud of the job the city has done addressing the unhoused population and welcoming asylum seekers. Dupuis said he sees room "there's too much division" in the community and questioned whether being a city versus a town might have something to do with it.

### **CITY COUNCIL**

Four candidates are running for two three-year terms. Incumbent Ayn Hanselmann is in her second term and is the chair of two subcommittees. She's an accountant and co-owner of a local accounting firm and the co-owner of Frannie's Mini Donuts. Incumbent Nathaniel Hitchcock has filled a council vacancy since April 2023. A Sanford native currently living in Springvale, he's a trial attorney. He's also a board member of the Sanford Mainers and a trustee of the Sanford Sewerage District. Two challengers, former councilors Joseph Hanslip and Victor Digregorio, were unable to attend the forum.

Hanselmann and Hitchcock both said they support the fire station project but expressed concern about the cost to taxpayers. Hanselmann said the council's job going forward will be to work on acquiring grants, leveraging funding and reducing operating expenditures to minimize the impact on taxation. Hitchcock said the project will only get more expensive if it's delayed and said it's incumbent on the council to work with state legislators to change some laws to reappropriate funding. He encouraged people to watch the informative forum from a few weeks ago on WSSR TV. Hitchcock said he intends to take a hard look at ways the budget can be cut during the next session; Hanselmann said she would like to see the council consider the municipal budget before the school budget so that city programs get more attention.

### SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Two candidates, Emily Sheffield and Lisa Blanchette, are seeking one three-

Jonathan Stimmell, a candidate for a one-year vacancy, was not asked to participate because he's running unopposed. Sheffield is completing a one-year term to which she was appointed. She is executive director of the Nasson Community Center and Little Theater and is also on the Sanford Board of Assessment Review. Blanchette worked in various roles at Sanford Community Adult Education for 40 years and now serves on several community non-profit boards, including the Alumni Association. She is president of Strategies for a Stronger Sanford.

Asked what programs or positions they consider non-negotiable during budget deliberations, Sheffield identified school social workers. She said the Alternative Education program at the high school could again come up for elimination, as it did this year. Blanchette said the proposal to eliminate Alternative Ed was what led her to consider running for the committee. She opposes doing away with whole programs or any one type of position.


Both candidates said they think students generally feel safe at school and credited staff and resource officers for creating a good atmosphere. Blanchette said it's important to be vigilant in following policies and that students, parents and others need to feel safe in reporting what they see and hear.

On the issue of cell phones, Sheffield encouraged parents to read the book, "An Anxious Generation," an in-depth look at cell phones and social media. She noted that the School Committee is planning a workshop on the issue of phones in schools in a few weeks. She said the current policy seems to be working. Blanchette said she looks forward to seeing the results of a survey of students, parents and teachers on this issue. She said phones should be turned off during class but noted that she was relieved a few years ago when her grandson was able to text that he was safe during a swatting incident.

### Gagné-Holmes confirmed as Maine

**DHHS commissioner:** The Maine Senate voted 24 to 8 on Oct. 10 to confirm Sara Gagné-Holmes as commissioner of the Maine Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). Gagné-Holmes, who grew up in Sanford, served as DHHS deputy commissioner for the past five years, and has led the department in an acting capacity since June 1, following the departure of Jeanne Lambrew.

Boxing up Christmas joy for impoverished children: On Oct. 6, the parishes of St. Thérèse of Lisieux in Sanford and St. Matthew Church in Limerick kicked off the Box of Joy Christmas project, a shoebox gift ministry that aims to help children suffering from extreme poverty.
